THE LABOUR LEAFLET.

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(1) ALYTH. — Æffff The Ploughmen's Club and Socialist Union is on the move. Branches are being formed. To begin with there will probably be timidity, but by and by members will gather courage if there happens to be aspirations enough to give encouragement.

Whenever there is desire shown the Committee of any Branch will be open to arrange meetings or prepare leaflets to have questions of social reform discussed for advance of mental culture thereon to effect a more general intelligence. Where general intelligence is a wanting practical effort cannot be made to promote ameliorations. The remedy thereof is — upset or abolish the cause, namely — lack of unity and intelligence based from the labour point of view.

(2) Male and Female Farm Servants, in a general majority, rather than bother doing anything to gain redress for their grievances, express deep feeling of disgust, to get away from their occupation if they could find any other means of getting a living. Is it not considered that thousands of persons suffer by the displacements from agricultural labour ? Concern, perplexity, and much iniquity is occasioned, and immoral unsociality result therefrom.

(3) Average Income for the United Kingdom is said, authentically, to be about $\check{c}140$ a year per adult man. Wealth is so unfairly divided, that one man gets $\check{c}1,000,000$ a year, whether he work none or sleep, another only $\check{c}25$ a year though he toils on from morning till night, or from being able to work till down in infirmity. A public servant of the State will get $\check{c}3$ an hour for acting — 9 without it tailó while an honest workman, sometimes with a deep grudge, gets a pittance of 4d an hour with much broken time unavoidable.

(4) Machinery, through monopoly, ingenuity, science, and cunning is supplanting large numbers of people depending on hard or physical and mental skilled labour. Working people do not make progress enough in lessening physical or to put it in other words, do not in custom get hours of labour shortened, or on the other hand letting those who toil none, advance to great advantage, in increased idleness, and extravagant superfluities by having monopolies, &c.
